The following Journal of Mineralogy is not recent but has many fascinating articles you will enjoy reading. It among others was donated to our library in 1980 by Dr. Merle Noble, in memory of his wife, Ruth. There are more interesting articles and pictures in each issue than I will highlight here and in next months article. These issues are fragile so handle with care!!

Mineral Digest-Volume 2 #169. The first astronauts to the moon brought back two boxes containing about 50 pounds of lunar rock and soil samples. After the twoweeks quarantine period samples of the precious

materials were doled out to investigating teams all over the world. The issue has 14 pages entitled "Moon Rocks" written by John Sinkankas and magnified color views by Jack Kath which kept me engrossed. As John Sinkankas wrote "When the boxes were opened in Houston, the contents appeared hopelessly charred after amateurish baking in a campfire, and then for good measure dusted with furnace flay ash." Memorial Day at Texas Springs By Dick Pankey

There are plans a foot to hold a Tri-Federation field trip and jamboree to Texas Springs over the Memorial Day Weekend 2003. This will be a get together of the Northwest, Rocky Mountain and California Federations. Texas Springs is located in the far northeast corner of Nevada, about 25 miles from the casino town of Jackpot.

Dean Richardson from the Wasatch Mineral Society has been going to Texas Springs each year for over 20 years and will be leading the collecting trips. And he was to be there again Memorial Day Weekend this year. Since we had no other plans Betty and I thought this would be a great opportunity to scout the area and learn and about it from the expert. So off we went to Texas Springs.

The Texas Springs collecting area is fairly extensive and is located east of Hwy 93 about halfway between Wells and Jackpot, NV. Twenty six miles north of Wells we turned northeast on to a gravel road and 34 miles later we found the "campgrounds". The campground was a series of small clearings carved out of the Sage Brush and Juniper trees. The Reno club was also there this weekend and space was at a premium. Dean had saved us a space and with a lot of help and directions, I was able to squeeze our new looooong trailer in amongst the junipers. This campground is small and suitable for small groups but not for the Tri-Federation trip.

Texas Springs is most noted for pink limb casts, but other colors of agate casts are plentiful. Small, finger size limb casts are abundant and fairly easy to find as float. The larger, nice pink limb casts require digging. We spent four days at Texas Springs and collected at 5 sites. Besides limb casts we found snakeskin agate and petrified wood. There are several dig sites for limb casts. The most productive for us was the site that Dean had been digging at the last few years. I dug a bucket full of small limbs and chunks one day. But Dean dug out 2 pink limb casts that were 14 inches long and 5 to 6 inches in diameter. These are the

kinds of specimens that make the work all worthwhile.

The weather was great for our stay, sunny, and warm, in the 70's, with cool nights. However, it had snowed a couple of days before we arrived. There were still patches of snow at the higher elevations on the green hillsides. It had been a wet spring, and many colors of wild flowers were in bloom everywhere.

On our way home we stopped for 2 nights at Ely and stayed at the free RV Park at the Holiday Inn. We dropped a few nickels into the machines in the casino and enjoyed the pool and hot tub. One of Betty's favorite collecting places are the mine dumps just east of Ely. We had them all to ourselves. These are dumps from a goldmine and are full of pyrite, peacock ore, other copper minerals, quartz and other minerals. We also found an old shed full of core drills.

We had a good safe, trouble free trip. The bad news was we did need new U-joints on the truck when we got home. The good news was that we made it home without a breakdown.


