She was famous for her pecan pies and when they were brought to the show they were gobbled up immediately. Visitors at the show probably never got a piece, as club members were all waiting for those pies to arrive! She will be missed.

I went on a wonderful historical trip to Washington D.C., Maryland and Virginia with my granddaughter's 8th grade class recently. I managed to keep up with them (barely). We walked miles and climbed a million stairs (8th graders don't believe in elevators). The hardest day was leaving S.F. on the "red eye", being met by the bus and going right to Mt. Vernon where we spent the day, a beautiful place, then ending up that night in Williamsburg, VA. It was a LONG night and day. We spent the next two days at Williamsburg, Jamestown, Yorktown and the surrounding historical areas and then back to D.C. We would leave early in the mornings and return late at night so we saw just about everything there was to see. I got to see the Smithsonian Gem and Mineral Hall – a WOW! Did you know they don't sell rock hammers at the Museum store there?

When we were at the archives where the Declaration of Independence was displayed, I felt like I was standing on holy ground. The weather cooperated wonderfully and we didn't get the promised rain until we had come from the Lincoln Memorial so we didn't get to see the WW II Memorial, which had opened that week, and made a fast trip by the Wall.

On Sat. morning we went to the Holocaust Memorial - very sobering to the kids – and spent the afternoon at Arlington National Cemetery. The teacher wanted to show the kids the inhumanity of man to man contrasting with the heroes who died for our freedom. The changing of the guard at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers was special. (I have been to Marble, CO where the white marble for the Lincoln Memorial and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers came from. We were not allowed to pick up any pieces of marble there but we were camped 20 miles away and found some marble along the Crystal river. There had been a flood in the 1940s and it washed downstream.) It was a great eight-day trip.

SNYDER'S POW WOW 2004

Sunny skies. Temperatures in the 70's. And spending the weekend with a great bunch of Rockhounds. We had fun Happy Hours each day and two delicious potluck dinners. We enjoyed all the sights and sounds of the Snyder's Pow Wow. Betty and I arrived on Wednesday and staked out the campsite for the combined group of North Bay Field Trips and Ye Old Timers Mineral Club. We camped together this year because of declining attendance by both groups. Most of the 35 people who camped with us arrived on Thursday and Friday with a couple of stragglers coming in on Saturday.

The Old Timers started out with a Margarita Happy Hour on Friday, in honor of Cinco de Mayo, followed by their potluck dinner that was attended by more than 55 people. After dinner the Old Timers held their annual auction. We had spirited bidding from over 100 people who attended. Highlights of the auction was a carving by Dick Friesen from Livermore, a great selection of several large pieces of Valley Springs moss agate, and Bob Pevahouse's jams and jellies. John Shoemaker and Dick Pankey were the auctioneers, with help from Wayne Meissner and Dick Friesen.

The Margarita Happy Hour was so good we repeated it on Saturday. Over 35 people attended the NBFT potluck dinner Saturday evening. After dinner we had the Grab Bag exchange. Only five people participated and we exchanged seven grab bags.

This year we had 35 campers in 7 trailers, 7 motorhomes and the rest in tents, cars, vans, and pick-ups. This is a big increase over last year, and it was great to have such a large group of campers. Twenty-two people (Old Timers, NBFTers and guests) helped direct traffic and people at the busy entrance gate at

the Pow Wow. Most of us worked all three days and some double shifts. It is fun helping and being part of the Pow Wow. This "work" earned each organization \$75. A BIG THANK YOU to all who helped out.

May you wake each day with His blessings, sleep each night in His keeping, and always walk in His tender care.


On rocks...

Okay, it's confession time. As your editor, I provide the news, schedules, events, and goodies of which you are familiar. I should also contribute a "column or two of interest to rockhounds."

Here's the rough part. I'm not a rockhound, I'm not an artist, I'm not into lapidary work, I don't even wear jewelry. However, I participate in this "rock sport" very willingly (since I get to hike and camp). I also collect buckets of leaverite – ask Dave!

I'm taking clues from two members who have submitted ideas (and even material!) for a column. I'll gracefully accept your feedback and input! Here's my first column, on a gem of which I had never heard (start with the unknown – there's more of it).


Iolite - the water sapphire



An outstanding specimen of cordierite (Orijärvi, Finland).

This stone is the gem variety of cordierite (after the French geologist P.L.A. Cordier), or dichroite (due to its very strong pleochroism), and was once known as a water sapphire from to its pale blue color. Iolite represents faith, and was used in France and England in the 18th century to form acrostics, expressing ones sentiment by combining the first letters of various gem names in a piece of jewelry.

The clear hues of iolite range from a medium cornflower blue, to a greyish-pink blue/purple, to a ripe grape purple. These colors never look quite the same from different angles, as iolite is built on a three-color axis (a pleochroic stone). This color configuration can be cut to bring out the stone's true beauty, exposing darker violets, colorless to light blues, and into honey-yellow tones, for some outstanding results. This is not a color-change property, such as alexandrite, but rather a blending of the colors. Iolite will sometimes produce cats-eyes.



Iolite forms in igneous and contact metamorphic rocks, with short, prismatic crystals.

This vitreous mineral is a silicate of magnesium and aluminum, occurring in irregular grains or masses, and closely resembles quartz. It has a distinct cleavage and conchoidal fractures. Iolite rates from 7 to 7.5 on the Mohs hardness scale, making it a choice gem for jewelry. Cordierite is most frequently found as pebbles, and can be located in the Chilean copper mines, in Finland, Germany, Greenland, and Madagascar, as well as various spots in the US, from Vermont through to North Dakota. Ceylon produces the gem quality material.

Board Meeting - May 10, 2004

The meeting was held at Matt and Ann Matthews home in Martinez, CA. PRESIDENT Ann Matthews opened the May Board of Directors (BOD) meeting at 7:30 p.m. The minutes from the April 2004 BOD meeting were accepted as published in the bulletin.

MEMBERSHIP CHAIR Kim Kleesattel reported mailing out three badges; two badges are ready to hand out this Friday.

PROGRAM VICE PRESIDENT Dave Kleesattel reported Mary Hicks will be giving the program for this month.

EDUCATION CHAIR Mary Ann King reported that Naomi Morgan's daughter Cheryl has volunteered to do a class this month on painting rocks. The class is the third Thursday, May 20th at Ann Matthews home and no class on the fourth Thursday. Ann has sent an application to the Adult Education business office to start renting a classroom for club classes.

The class in July will be given by Barrie Bieler, who will do a course on gem and mineral identification at his home in Walnut Creek. June is still open for someone to volunteer to give a class.

A class on wire wrapping by Glen MacKenzie may be later this year. Betty Pankey is doing a stained glass class in September.

FIELD TRIP CHAIR Dick Pankey announced that the CFMS show, which is at the end of May, will have a field trip for soapstone. Dick also reported a trip in June to Echo Mountain, which is located off of Hwy. 139, due west of Davis Creek and south of Tule Lake. The group will then go to Davis Creek. Dick is making sure the cleanup activity in the camping sites will be completed in time for the trip. More information will be on hand at the Friday meeting.

June 5th, the Antioch Rock Club will have a rock swap at their club house.

Unrelated, but if anyone needs a fold-up exhibit case, Dick has one for sale that needs a little refinishing. Money from this sale goes to the Old Timers Mineral Club.

Dick then gave a good report on the recent activity at Snyder's Pow Wow. Members had a good time at the Pow Wow and there were two great potluck dinners. The dinners and an auction were lit up by a "new" electrical system that was donated by our club. The electric box will be stored at Snyder's.

PROPERTY CHAIR Glen Hubbard is trying to resurrect the silver pin depicting Diablo Dan. None of the molds have been up to standard. Eva Umholtz has a good looking Diablo Dan so this unit will be used to make a mold.

HOSPITALITY CHAIR Sharon Neuhauser thanks everyone for helping at the funeral for Anne Pevahouse. Ann Matthews did a nice speech and she also made a beautiful cake for after the service. A remaining portion of the cake was enjoyed after the BOD meeting. Bob Pevahouse thanks everyone for their support.

DISPLAY CHAIR John Owen had no report at this time but asked for members to make cabs for competition.

SHOW CHAIR Sam Woolsey stated show meetings will start in July. Hazel Woolsey is going to call Linda Minich to see if she has enough critters for the show.

CFMS REP Bob Pevahouse reported on the CFMS Annual Show in Mariposa, 5/28 to 5/30. Camping is first-come, first-serve. Over a hundred camping sites are available. They can provide power to all campers; bathroom and showers and a pump station are included. There is also an Editors breakfast. Camping is \$20 per night, even for car sleepers. Exhibits are usually great at the annual show, so plan on attending the show. Bob spoke next on the Earth Science seminar in September at Camp Paradise; the CFMS forms are not out yet. Most likely the registration forms will be available at the CFMS Mariposa show. There may still be room for the summer workshop for juniors.

No report from Hazel Woolsey.

TREASURER Eva Umholtz reported that she went to Washington Mutual about a money market account. The interest rate is too low at this time to make any use of this type of account. NEW BUSINESS John Owen asked about the need for jewelry saws and files for the classes. Dick Pankey asked how the telephone tree worked. Eva Umholtz brought up the Santa Clara club's study groups on items such as beading, carvers, fossils, etc. These groups meet once per month to allow members to work on specialty items, and their bulletin includes the list of groups and meeting information. There are also little write-ups of what the groups are doing. Members are encouraged to put a standing item notice in the newsletter so people can learn about focus group meetings.

The board decided to put a questionnaire in the bulletin for our club to see if people are interested in focus groups, and if they would be a leader for a group. Fall is a good time to plan for the focus groups to start up. Barrie Bieler already has a focus group on faceting. Questionnaire will be developed by Eva Umholtz. Participation will be limited to club members.



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
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
