Black Diamond Mines Outing

An undulatory surface or surface sculpture consisting of alternating small-scale ridges and hollows formed at the interface between a fluid and sedimentary material (esp. loose sand).

The Hazel-Atlas mine produced high quality silicasand that was used in the making of glass jars. Highly sought after by collectors, a mason jar and saltshaker with the HA logo embossed on the base were available to the tour members. The sands of this ancient seabed make up the rocks of our nearby foothills and the Diablo range. Undulating ripple patters are clear on the roof of the mine. This pattern is possible evidence of shallow water moving over the sand leaving the pattern we see millions of years later.
