Rob will host a local Creek Crawl on Donner Creek in Clayton. I am personally looking to pick up a few stream-washed stones from a local creek.



# **Black Diamond Mines Outing**

On a beautiful early spring day, intense green hills, and a sky so blue it hurts to look at, we met in the early morning chill for the short walk up to the mine entrance.

Rudy Trautner, with help from his wife Mary Dougherty, organized and led our first club outing of the year. Over 20 people attended with members from CCMGS and the Calaveras Gem and Mineral Society.

The Black Diamond Mines History Tour covers two mining eras in the park. Coal mining took place in the late 19th century, and the Hazel-Atlas sand mine was active in the early 20th century. The wonderful park docents wove a compelling story of early mining activities and hardships. Impressive, near life-sized posters depicting early miners lined the entry tunnel and several fixed displays depicted miners working the shallow coal seams.

# **WHAT DOES THAT MEAN? - Ripple Marks**

An undulatory surface or surface sculpture consisting of alternating small-scale ridges and hollows formed at the interface between a fluid and sedimentary material (esp. loose sand).

# Black Dimond Mines, Cont.

The Hazel-Atlas mine produced high quality silicasand that was used in the making of glass jars. Highly sought after by collectors, a mason jar and saltshaker with the HA logo embossed on the base were available to the tour members. The sands of this ancient seabed make up the rocks of our nearby foothills and the Diablo range. Undulating ripple patters are clear on the roof of the mine. This pattern is possible evidence of shallow water moving over the sand leaving the pattern we see millions of years later.

Our tour was a rousing success; thank you Rudy.

Tour Guide: Rob Savre



PROPOSED SCHEDULE - Begin at 10:00 at the Goat Rock Parking lot with talk by geologist about local rock formations followed by beach combing. Carpool a mile uphill to view and learn about marine terraces, sea stacks & the Mammoth Rubbing Rock. At Noon, leave Goat Rock and caravan a half hour south to Bodega head for lunch stop (BRING SACK LUNCH) at Campbell Cove on Bodega Bay and talk about faults. Drive one mile uphill to Bodega Head for talk about plate tectonics. END of PROGRAM & CHECK OUT with Karol.
