#### CFMS Newsletter Items August

From Your Insurance Chairman Fred Ott

As I mentioned at the Federation meeting in Ventura, our Federation's insurance agent/broker anticipates the possibility of a significant restriction of coverage following the October 16<sup>th</sup> renewal

of the Federation's liability insurance policy.

Specifically, there may be an exclusion for any special event (including meetings) where more than 300 individuals are in attendance. This would include gem show and other special events.

A questionnaire was distributed to each director in attendance at the Directors meeting and a copy was included in the Director packet mailed to each club that did not have a representative in attendance. It is extremely important to have the questionnaire completed and mailed to me for forwarding to the Federation's insurance agent/broker.

Special events not including this year's policy renewal may be very expensive to add at a later date.

#### How the CFMS Scholarship Fund Works

Your Club or Society has someone as a Scholarship Honoree prior to the November business meeting. This person will have made substantial contributions toward furthering the educational purposes and goals of the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies.

The person does not need to be a member of a Club or Society. Honorees selected will have the opportunity to offer a \$2,000 scholarship to the college or university of their choice. The scholarship will go to the student

who will be attending that school as a junior or senior in the Fall term 2004, majoring in the Earth Sciences or Jewelry Arts, and achieving a 3.0 grade point average.

A school is selected who then selects a post graduate student that is continuing their Earth Science education. The seven Federations each select one person to receive an AFMS scholarship consisting of \$2,000 per year, for 2 years for a total of \$4,000.

The origins are hot, wet, viscous silica and feldspar plasma. The rough outer surface belies the exciting patterns and picture displayed inside. We learned they have a dimple inside.

We were all witness to Dave demonstrating with a model the fracture pattern of thundereggs for the first time on the north American continent. Very clever! Lots of fracture planes are at 30 and 60 degrees, a typical 4 or 5 corner patterns is the result. Thundereggs are found world wide in volcanic areas, except New Zealand. Richardson Ranch had opal filled thundereggs.

The meeting was adjourned at 8:30PM. We lingered over visiting and refreshments.
