### The Largest Known Geode

Discovered in Rio de Sul, Brazil weighed about 70,000 pounds. Its length was 33 feet, diameter 10 feet one way and 16.5 feet the other. The interior was completely lined with amethyst crystals. After being broken up, it provided tons of amethyst crystals and many fine gemstones. One 400-lb. section of the geode is at the Smithsonian.

Rockhounds and outdoor enthusiasts lost a dedicated friend and advocate for the protection of public lands. **Bob Cranston** passed away on Sunday, January 2<sup>nd</sup> 2005 from pneumonia.

His total dedication to ALAA was unsurpassed by any one of us who worked toward keeping public lands open to rockhounds. His contacts kept us all informed on all of the many areas of concern. He watched for any closures of public land and pending litigation from all sources that would infringe on our rights to collect on public land.

Bob's interpretation of the government's term "multiple use of public land" was his cornerstone of concern. At earlier meetings of ALAA, everyone waited impatiently for Bob to speak to the concerns of the day. His knowledge of what was happening concerning public lands was invaluable. He spent many hours each day searching websites for coming and pending legislation and possible lawsuits by environmentalists.

Bob served AFMS and ALAA with distinction. There will never be another person as dedicated as Bob to our cause. We have lost our heart and soul today.



Bruce also reports that First Vice President of Field Trips Dick Pankey and he are talking about a field trip to the Middletown area. There is the Manhattan Mine that produced a lot of mercury and other minerals in the area. The mine was also known as the One Shot Mercury Mine. Over 50 minerals have been catalogued from the mine pit. Bay Area Mineralogist may come too. UC Davis is doing graduate environmental studies in the area. Another possible field trip location is Cal Pine's museum in Middletown, south of Clear Lake. Also, a bus takes people up to a geothermal site to see the processing system.

President Dave Kleesattel brought up the idea of looking into chartering a bus to take members to such activities as Snyder's Pow Wow in Valley Springs in May. Need to check the insurance coverage to see if there is an additional fee for sponsoring something like this.



The village of New Idria, where much of the Mercury mined in California originated. The story of poppy jasper mine might be of interest as well.

Perhaps a field trip where you found something special or an area with historical interest associated with our hobby. As you can see, there is grist for many exciting and interesting shows featuring rocks and rockhounding.

#### Museum Corner

If you like fossils, one museum you have to see is the Sierra College Natural History Museum. Located in Rocklin (northeast of Sacramento), it

has a fine exhibit of local and U.S. fossils, many of them collected by the students and instructors while on class field trips.

There is a case tracing the story of life in fossils from algal balls to primates. Local fossils from the Ice Age were discovered when the Arco Arena was constructed to house the Sacramento Kings. Parts of bison, camels, horse, and other animals excavated are on display.

Also, there is a large log of the famous Eocene Roseville petrified wood.

There is a surprisingly large dinosaur exhibit, including a rare pachycephalosaurus skull that I got to help excavate. There are parts of other dinosaurs that have been found in northern California, including a hypsoliphodont leg and a piece of a meat-eating dinosaur found in Granite Bay/Sacramento. You can see parts of a pfapterosaur found in northern California and a giant turtle.

There are sea mammal fossils, a titantothere skull, and a gompothere. In addition to all the fossils, there is an extensive skull display, from bats to elephants. And stuffed animal heads from around the world. There is a fine mineral display.

Outside there is a labeled nature trail and desert rock garden. Admission to the Sierra College Natural History Museum is free when the college is in session. Special tours can be arranged for groups. For those of you planning to attend the CFMS show in Roseville in June; plan to visit this great little museum located in Sewell Hall at 5000 Rocklin Road in Rocklin, CA, website: www.sierramuseum.org.

### The History Channel to Feature Barstow's Desert Search and Rescue Unit

The Barstow Sheriff's station's all-volunteer Desert Search and Rescue Squad will appear in a segment of *Modern Marvels* on The History Channel, airing some time in mid-February with the title: "Desert Tech." The show concentrates on the technology people use to survive in desert climates. Members of the Sheriff's reserve unit are also featured.

The show emphasizes the planning, structuring, and equipment required to mount a search for injured or lost desert visitors. Barstow's S&R Squad is one of few units in the state, and the only one in San Bernardino County that handles mineshaft rescues. Thirty volunteers and deputies deployed ten ATVs, a fully functional command post, a newly modified sandrail, and a horse to participate in the S&R reenactment.

These volunteers work for free, typically pay for a lot of their own equipment, and remain on call 24 hours a day, seven days a week to help folks like us rockhounds.

# Safety First

The Shell Company recently issued a warning after three incidents in which mobile (cell) phones ignited furnes during automobile fueling operations.

In the first case, the phone was placed on the car's trunk lid during fueling; it rang and the ensuing fire destroyed the car and the gasoline pump.

In the second, an individual suffered severe burns to the face when fumes ignited as he answered a call while refueling a car.

And in the third case, an individual suffered severe burns to the thigh and groin as furnes ignited when the phone, which was in his pocket, rang while he was fueling his car. You should know that:

- Mobile phones can ignite fuel or fumes!
- Mobile phones that light up when switched on or when they ring release enough energy to provide a spark for ignition.
- Mobile phones should not be used in filling stations, or when fueling lawn mowers, boats, etc.
- Mobile phones should not be used, or should be turned off, around other materials that generate flammable or explosive fumes or dust; i.e., solvents, chemicals, gases, grain dust, etc.

To sum it up, here are the Four Rules for safe refueling:

- Turn off engine
- 2) Don't smoke
- Don't use your cell phone leave it inside the vehicle or turn it off
- 4) Don't re-enter your vehicle during fueling.

If you absolutely HAVE to get in your vehicle while the gas is pumping, make sure that when you get out, you close the door TOUCHING THE METAL before you ever pull the nozzle out. This way, the static from your body will discharge before you ever remove the nozzle.
