

May Program California Geological Survey Staying Relevant After 150 Years

Before the USGS there was the CGS -- the California Geological Survey.

It began in 1853, the heyday of the gold rush, when the California Legislature appointed a State Geologist to provide information on the State's gold resources.

In 1860 they named Josiah Whitney (of Mount Whitney fame) as the second State Geologist. Whitney's first works were on flora and fauna. The Legislature wanted information on gold, not plants!

After the Legislature cut his budget, Whitney's crusty and abrasive nature did not sit well with the Legislature. He characterized them as corupt, reckless, stupid, malignant, and jackasses. Whitney was replaced. So Began the California Geological Survey.

Over the last 150 years, the CGS has had six different names, and twelve different logos, and it has evolved. Today, the Survey is not just mining. The CGS provides relevant, modern, detailed geologic maps, reports and data about the state's geology, seismology and mineral resources for the people of California. Much of this is highly relevant to rockhounds.

Our May Speaker is Dr. John G. Parrish, California State Geologist and head of the California Geological Survey. Dr Parrish will entertain us as he relates the exciting and sometimes irreverent stories of the 150-year history of the CGS. He will tell us how the CGS has stayed relevant after all these years and still provides a wealth of resources for the people of California – and rockhounds.

Dr. Parrish is primary spokesperson for the CGS with the Director of the Department of Conservation, the Resources Agency, the Governor's Office, the State Legislature, and the State Mining and Geology Board.

Prior to his current position, he was the Executive Officer for the State Mining and Geology Board and Executive Officer for the Board of Registration for Geologists and Geophysicists. Dr. Parrish worked 21 years in geological exploration for the petroleum industry.

A native of California, he was raised in Los Angeles. He is a California licensed Professional Geologist, Certified Professional Geologist, Certified Petroleum Geologist, and a Founding Member of the Energy Minerals Division.

Recently Parrish was awarded the *John T. Galey, Sr. Memorial Public Service Award* by the American Institute of Professional Geologists. This national award is given to an individual for outstanding public service well beyond the normal professional responsibilities.



Joe Yarbrough has a ready smile and has much knowledge to share with other members about rocks and enameling. He is an active member who can be found at most club functions and has been Display Chair, President and has done many jobs at the annual education show in November. His melodic voice is a favorite for making announcements at the show. He will be helping with the annual club auction at the June General Meeting when we raise money for geological scholarships. If you do not know Joe, please introduce yourselves at the next meeting.

Joe remembers that Lou Hamilton got him interested in rocks when they met in the 1950's as Air Force reservists. Joe went on a field trip with Lou and that sealed his fate. Joe retired from Chevron in 1990. His favorite rock is Graveyard Point agate. He started working on cabs in 1991 and has excelled in creating cabs and has over 300 cabs

of Graveyard in his collection. He won seven cab competitions in 1993. You will notice his name often in the newsletter where competitors for the monthly cab contests are listed.

Picnic field trip was a
huge success with
approximately 50

people showing up from many clubs. These eager rockhounds traveled for hours in the early morning hours to reach the town of Coulterville on Highway 49 in the Motherlode country. After an orientation, the group caravanned to a a Mariposite quarry five miles away. We parked and collected just inside the property ... digging and hammering away until we got our fill of that pretty rock – some bright green-glue, some dark green – some with a lot of quartz showing, and some without. There were rocks showing a light dusting of purple and the blue/green which was interesting and I can't wait to see it cut and polished. That was a popular rock for many to collect.

We couldn't make the hike up the hill and over and down to the quarry since the recent rains had caused a slide of trees and mud which covered the roadway.

Louis Bickford, Coulterville resident – cattle ranch and Trading Post store owner – is caretaker for the quarry. He is helping out George Mallory, owner, who is ailing. Louis welcomes clubs to contact him to make a reservation to visit the quarry to purchase Mariposite rock, any time. He also has prime grade beef for sale. Call or e-mail me if you can't find his phone number listed in the Coulterville area.

After the quarry, we went on tour at the Al Haigh ranch which was very close by – driving through the working cattle ranch with an array of farm animals running around. Again, the recent rains cause a few problems on the dirt roads and we parked down from the mine so everyone who toured the underground gold mine had to walk a little ways uphill. Crystals and Mariposite were located a little too far for us to be walking up from the mine to the top of the hills where it is located – so this will have to be another field trip during dry weather when we can drive up to it.

Interesting talks were given to the group by both Louis Bickford and Al Haigh during our visits. In all, it was a worthwhile collecting trip and interesting experience. Everyone seemed to be having a good time. Enjoy the photos posted by Terry!

Directions: From the South – Traveling east or west on US 20 turn north on Van Lake Rd. (mile marker 52) go north approximately 16 miles. Watch for camp signs as you approach Camp Creek road. Road is a maintained gravel road.

Directions: From the North – Driving from Prineville, Oregon go east on highway 380 to mile marker 44, turn south (or right) on Camp Creek road and drive south until you get to the junction of Van Lake Rd. Watch for signs (all but the last several miles are paved)

Rock Samples for US Forest Service Display

At the MLMS Show in Turlock, CA a couple of weeks ago, I met Mike Hunerlach from the US Forest Service and he told me of his need for rock and mineral specimens from Forest Service land in California. As we talked about it I realized that this would be a great project for CFMS and that I wanted to help with it.

Each year the USDA Forest Service sponsors an informational display booth at the annual Tucson Gem and Mineral Show along with displays from other Federal Land Management Agencies and professional mineral and gem societies. The USDA Forest Service booth has a display of the types of minerals and rocks that are typically found in the National Forests across the United States and Alaska. This display and rock samples are also used at other shows and meetings. Michael Hunerlach is in charge of organizing and setting up the display scheduled for February 2012.

There are 17 National Forests in California and I am sure that rockhound collectors of the CFMS have collected in all of them so this should be easy for us to provide rock samples for Mike. Mike is looking for samples of rocks and/or mineral specimens known to occur in the National Forests of California. This should not be a problem because the samples are probably already in our collections and rock piles. Please check with District Ranger Staff for areas of casual and/or restricted collecting sites for individual Forests located in California. Below is a list of preferred criteria:

- 1) Size should be in the range of miniature to small cabinet specimen (2-4 inches in diameter).
- 2) Each sample needs to be identified with: name of rock or mineral; location collected including which National Forest; GPS position (very desirable); when collected; name of person and society; and any other specific information you wish to provide.

We want to get specimens that are "typical" and representative of each National Forest. We are not trying to get samples of "every rock" in every Forest. I am donating obsidian samples from the Davis Creek collecting area of the Modoc National Forest so we have 16 more National Forests to go. If you would like to help with this project and donate rocks, please send me an e-mail with the name of the rock and the name of the National Forest where it was collected. Please email or contact me before bringing or sending me specimens to

avoid duplication. The rest of the information can be supplied when you give me your donation. Go through your rock pile and collecting records to see what you have to donate to this project. I will start accepting donations at the CFMS Show and Convention at Anderson, CA in May.

Since we are going through the effort to get specimens for the Forest Service we might as well prepare a display of rocks collected on National Forest land for the CFMS. So I am asking the people that donate specimens to donate a second specimen for a CFMS display. We are looking for good to high quality specimens that show the typical/classical characteristics and are representative of the rocks and minerals to be found in each of the National Forests in California.

Here is a list of the National Forests in California: Angeles National Forest **Cleveland National Forest** Eldorado National Forest **Inyo National Forest** Klamath National Forest Lake Tahoe Basin Management Unit Lassen National Forest Los Padres National Forest Mendocino National Forest Modoc National Forest Plumas National Forest San Bernardino National Forest Sequoia National Forest Shasta-Trinity National Forest Sierra National Forest Six Rivers National Forest Stanislaus National Forest **Tahoe National Forest**

Check out your maps, field trip fliers and collecting records to see where you have collected and what samples you may have to donate.

This project has many benefits to rockhounds and the CFMS. Working with the managers of our public lands is one way to develop a personal relationship enabling us to get to know one another; it will show what and where we collect so that these areas can be preserved for future collecting; it enhances our position and credibility as a responsible user of public lands; and other benefits.

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
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
