### Library Report By Bill McKay

Book Title: Economic Mineral Deposits Author: Alan Bateman Library No.: 1

The first edition of this book appeared at the end of 1942. Since that time war and postwar readjustment has forcibly demonstrated the extent to which the materials of the mineral kingdom constitute the backbone of industrial life and peace time economic development of nations. Formerly bountiful supplies now show serious depletion, and nations of the world are looking farther and farther a field for those mineral supplies necessary to their subsistence.

This book deals with such mineral deposits, how they are formed, what they are, how and where they occur, and what they are used for. Its chief purpose is as a textbook, designed both for elementary and more advanced courses.

lecture on rocks, minerals
and fossils.

Russ Shoemaker, owner of Stories in Stone, will present a 1 1/2 to 2-hour presentation on rocks. minerals and fossils. Russ and Pam Shoemaker have one of the most comprehensive geological displays of thousands of rocks, minerals and fossils in California. Stories in Stone was located in Murphy for many years but closed its doors when the building was sold about 4 years ago. The Shoemakers reopened their famous and fabulous rock emporium and educational facility in late 2000. They completed their impressive educational area and resumed giving presentations to school and other groups in 2002. Following this presentation you will have time to see the rest of their store and exhibits.

Utah's septarian nodules started in Southern Utah 100 million years ago in the Gulf of Mexico at the time when decomposing sea life attracted sediment, forming mud balls. These were rolled around by tidal action; this increased their size. When the sea receded, the balls dried and cracked at the same time the benitonitic clay in them shrank. Then

the ocean returned and dissolved calcite, from sea life, was carried into the cracks where crystals formed. A thin wall of calcite formed into aragonite, dividing the clay exterior from the calcite centers. This dividing wall, septa in Latin, gave them the name "septarians." They occur in Tropic Shale in Long Valley near Mt. Carmel and Orderville, Utah.

The Oxford Hills in western Maine are known throughout the world as a prolific source of gems such as tourmaline, amethyst, and aquamarine, as well as many rare mineral species. Thousands of people come to Maine every year to search for these minerals in
the rock piles left behind
from earlier mining
operations. Historic mining
for feldspar and gem
tournaline in the town of
Newry opened up several
deposits rich in uncommon
minerals, these mines are
located on a scenic
mountaintop that also offers
great opportunities for hiking
geologic studies, and other
outdoor recreation.

Many popular mineral collecting sites in Maine have been closed to the public in recent years due to encroaching development and other factors. But the State of Maine now has the opportunity to acquire a 100-acre tract of land in Newry that encompasses the famous Dunton tourmaline mine and six other neighboring quarries.

The Maine Geological Survey (of the Department of Conservation) has launched a fundraising drive to purchase the Newry mines for a permanent park whose principal use would be for recreational mineral collecting. Partners in this effort include the Maine Mineral Symposium Association, the Federation of Maine Mineral and Gem Clubs, and the Threshold to Maine Resources Conservation and Development Commission.

All mineral hobbyists, earth science students, educators, and outdoor enthusiasts will benefit from the Newry Mineral Park. The Land for Maine's Future board has made a generous pledge toward the purchase price, but most of the funds to acquire the property must be raised from other sources. The Maine Geological Survey is committed to this effort, and we are asking mineral clubs and individuals to help by donating to the park acquisition fund.

Popcorn Cake

6 quarts popped popcorn
½ lb cocktail peanuts
1 lb gumdrops cut up,
remove the black gumdrops
¼ cup vegetable oil
¼ lb margarine, or one cube
1 lb marshmallows

Melt the vegetable oil, margarine, and marshmallows and pour over the popcom, peanuts and gumdrops. Mix will. When mixed, press into a buttered angel food cake pan or some other pan. I put the popcorn mixture in a small roaster pan. I like to make a day ahead of time.

Fantasy Fudge By Barbara Snook Via Napa Gems, Napa Valley Rock & Gem Club

3 cups sugar
3/4 cup cubed margarine
2/3 cup (51/3 fl oz can)
evaporated milk
1-12 oz pkg semi-sweet
chocolate pieces
1-7 oz jar Kraft
Marshmallow Crème
1 cup chopped nuts 1 tsp
vanilla

Combine sugar, margarine & milk in heavy 2 ½ qt sauce pan. Bring to full rolling boil, stirring constantly (mixture scorches easily). Remove from heat; stir in chocolate pieces until melted. Add marshmallow crème, nuts and vanilla; beat until well blended. Pour into greased 13x9 inch pan. Cool at room temperature; cut into squares. Makes 3 pounds.

Variation. For peanut butter fudge, substitute 1 cup of creamy or chunk style peanut butter for chocolate pieces. Omit nuts.
