

Dennis Freiburger introduced Naomi Morgan at 8:11 pm. Naomi was there to speak on Intarsia while her daughter, Cheryl, was there to operate the computer. Naomi introduced herself and mentioned the names of famous people and places, using intarsia as an artform.

Among many different methods, Naomi, after many many years of creating art, uses the following methods for intarsia. She finds a picture that she would like to reproduce in her own version, then draws a map, goes to the rock pile, finds appropriate colors and sizes then she polishes the rocks. If they don't fit, she modifies the size with trim saws. She also uses the following tools: Flat laps, small diamond flat laps, trim saws, rotary hand tools, glass cutters, band saws and screw drivers.

To add to those tools, she also uses angle grinders, core drills, other rotary tools, cutting discs and a twopart expoxy glue.

After a wonderful and informative discussion, she answered questions and was available for individual questions after the close of the program. The program ended at 8:37pm.

Naomi presented photographs of many pieces of her work. She also had many on display in the front of the room.

She was presented with a club certificate and coffee cup.



There are a great number of activities for kid and the family. Book bags for the kids will be handed out on Saturday and Sunday at the show. Fun and Educational Kids' Activities include:



Intarsia The Art of Stone Painting

Intarsia, also called Pietra Dura, is the inlay technique of using cut and fitted, highly polished colored stones to create images. The two dimensional lapidary art has flourished for several centuries – most notably in Florence from the 16th century. Detailed, exacting work must be performed so that the contact between each section is practically invisible.

Naomi Morgan was carving in various stones during the 1980's. Wanting to use her remnant rock stock, she became inspired to develop Intarsia as an additional skill. Naomi is presently a volunteer instructor of Intarsia arts at the Mineral and Gem Society of Castro Valley – passing on her almost 30 years of knowledge. Regularly attending our society's meetings as a longtime member, it's time for her to show us her wonderful creations and how she does it.
