
Desserts For Fun & Profits Bring a Dessert To the Show

Federation Director's Report

Typically the CFMS Show and Convention is held earlier in the year (May or June), but this time it was held in September at the El Dorado County Fairgrounds hosted by the El Dorado County M&GS. This show was held in conjunction with the World Gold Panning Championship which was a big and very interesting event. There were at least 600 competitors from over 30 countries from all around the world. Unless you see it for yourself it is hard to describe the competition -- the pageantry, the process and the excitement. There were even cheers and cheerleaders to excite the crowd and competitors. But the CFMS had a lot going on, also; we had a full. active weekend. Betty and I arrived at the Fairgrounds on Wednesday morning and parked and set up our trailer in the new, expanded camping area. There were 46 camper flying flags from around the world. By any measure this was a BIG show: 72 dealers, 80+ exhibit cases, 10 demonstrators, more than 15 kid's activities, silent auction, rock sale tables, geode cutting and a big selection of food venders. The EDCM&GS did an outstanding job of planning and putting on this wonderful show.

The CFMS Directors' meeting was held on Saturday morning. There were 52 societies represented. In addition to the usual business of minutes and treasurer's reports, there were over 30 written or oral committee reports given.

Meeting highlights:

A quorum was established – 52 Directors, over 30 Committees, and 5 Officers. The Federation is made up of over 100 clubs and societies. Unfortunately, many Federation Directors don't attend our meetings; therefore their club's voice and opinions are not heard. The Federation is working to improve attendance and participation in Federation meetings and activities.

Two societies are delinquent and most probably will be dropped from the Federation.

Kim Campbell-Erb, 2nd VP and Louisa Cary, Secretary resigned their positions on the CFMS Board and were replaced by Shirley Leeson and Jenifer Haley, respectfully.

Ten Past Presidents attended. The past presidents remain active on committees and attend shows and meetings. There were 8 new first time directors. The 2017 show will be in Ventura in June.

The Education Through Sharing Recognition was changed to Rockhound of the Year. This is the same as the AFMS recognition that was changed several years ago. Only 8 societies have participated this year including CCM&GS recognizing Gary Casillas. (So sad. A missed opportunity to recognize the efforts and contribution of one of our members). The application for All American Club Award has been updated. Only one society from CFMS participated this year. This is a great and rewarding program the CCM&GS should participate in. All we need is someone to lead and organize our entry. If you like to brag about/promote CCM&GS this is an activity for you. Contact me for information and details.

AMFS Marion Roberts from the Mother Lode MS is the outgoing president and submitted an excellent, detailed report. There are 50,460 from the 7 federations. CFMS has 6535members, down from over 10,000 members just a few years ago. CFMS Endowment Fund -- is conducting the Silent Auction at the show. 2 societies presented checks to the Fund.

AFMS Endowment Fund -- Is conducting a raffle again this year, many items. I will have tickets available at our meetings. 2 societies presented checks to the Fund.

The Golden Bear Awards to people that have given outstanding service to the Federation. This year two awards will be presented at the Banquet.

The Nominating committee is soliciting nominations from the societies for 2016 CFMS officers.

The Scholarship Committee is soliciting nominations from the societies for Scholarship Honorees to select schools and undergraduate candidates for \$2000 scholarships. There is plenty of money available for undergraduate CFMS Scholarships, but they can't be given out if our societies do not nominate honorees to select schools and recipients. Only two honorees and therefore only two scholarship this year. 2 societies presented check to the Fund.

Pat LaRue our Tax Advisor reminds all societies to file their "e-post cards" to prevent loss of their tax status.

I presented 2 small shopping bags of stamps to Debbie Bunn who gives them to Easter Seals in Sacramento. 3 other societies also presented stamps. Thanks to all of you that have participated and given me stamps.



The slides in the Visual Program Library are being converted to digital format.

I have copies of the meeting packet and reports if anyone is interested.

The next CFMS Meeting will be in November in Visalia. If anyone is interested I have a copy of all of the written reports.

In the afternoon following the Directors meeting, as a Past President of CFMS, I attended the Long Range Planning Committee meeting. The purpose of the LRP Committee is to study and make recommendations for projects which will further the programs of the CFMS and report the results to the Directors. The committee is made up of all living Past Presidents of CFMS and the current Executive Committee. Currently we are focusing on expanding leadership for the Federation and the local societies, Federation/Society relationship, and defining, clarifying, and communicating The duties and function of the Federation Director.

Saturday evening was the awards banquet: The 2 CFMS Scholarship honorees and their 2 students were introduced, trophies for the competitive case winners were presented, the Golden Bear awards were presented, the All American Club award was presented and the Show chairman and host society was recognized and thanked for the great show and convention.


