Dick Pankey has volunteered to pull the trailer to the show and back to storage for the 2018 show. Thank You Dick. Dick Pankey and Betty will be the Exhibitor Chairs. (These are the displays in cases containing works of art and items of interest and beauty.) Members should start working on a NEW display now, let's keep the show fresh and continue to amaze fellow members and show attendees. Dick and Chuck have already made plans on using tumbled fluorite in bottles for the Case Favors for the 2018 show. The favors last year where pretty specimens of Fuchsite. The minerals were selected by Dick Pankey and assembled by Chuck Olson.

Terry Caskey has volunteered to work on the Floor Plan again this year. He and Mike are looking at reorganizing the back room (Activity Room has the vinyl floors and Diablo Dan's Cafe.) Mike has a program to help in this task. The goal is to make the room an open concept area. The Demonstrators would be arranged in the middle of the room with the Exhibits circling them lining the walls. Tables and wiring will be reviewed. This is an item left over from 2017 when there was not enough time to organize this change. Terry reported on the nice performance of the LED lights in some of the display cases at the 2017 Show. These bulbs have a low draw on power and they worked last year. It is recommended to move to these lights as the decrease in power demand helps with setup design and is also environmentally responsible.

Chuck Olson has a Big Surprise and he wants to have a power plug for the Grab Bag wheel. He asks members to collect small rocks for tumbling or for critters for the show. Also, look through your rock collections and collect those tumble ready rocks and bring them to a meeting asap. Members who can tumble need to be provided with rough rock to tumble as soon as possible. It is easier to pick up the smaller rocks that are often ignored by rockhounds.

Grab Bags are being organized by Donna Albrecht. Chuck reported visiting Hazel Woolsey and he picked up some sewn grab bags. We needed, really need, polished tumble rock or specimens for the Grab Bags. I believe Donna wants the Grab Bags filled and stored for the show by June.

Treasurer Mary Hanjes discussed the Float money.

Show Publicity Mike Hopkins requested a copy of the Bylaws, Mary Hicks will provide a copy. She will put together the information from Christine Henningsson for the 2017 Show. One place to post the show information is at the CFMS website under the club show listing. This is done by going to the website. The write up for the Rock and Gem Magazine can also go in soon. Mary will provide the article written by Christine to R&G, mail Bylaws, and instructions for the CFMS website. Mike puts on a wonderful educational display of rocks and minerals at shows for young rockhounds. Signs. In general, the show needs new signs and more signs and new lights. The need of more attractive signs was a prominent comment from the 2017 show. Many signs for the building and street are needed. Multiple signs help attendees navigate the show make a list of all the signs you think of including placement and suggested draft wording and get these to the committee. Our Graphics Guru Bob Rigor is ready to start working on sign designs and Mike

Hopkins has design ideas and to construct stands. This is a call to all members-send in your ideas to Mary at maryhicks@comcast.net.

Debbie Blevins (Not present but sent in her report). If these areas for the show have not yet been taken she volunteers to: Make Ming Trees, Make Critters, and manage the Front Door. Answer- Wonderful, Thank You! Details-she is happy to arrange meetings to make miniature Ming (gem) trees and critters for the wheels (or wherever they have historically been used). She can set up something at her home for those who would like to get their creative juices flowing and participate. She doesn't know what is left from last year so she is not sure if we need any at all. Debbie volunteers to be the Front Door person again, although she wants to discuss with the committee what jobs specifically are encompassed in it. Is everything in the front area (Lobby) considered front door? At this time yes. Will there be a table for Membership Information? Membership is likely to be elsewhere as the Lobby has terrible acoustics. It is also better to have Membership related activities consolidated so we minimize the number of members needed to support this function. Signage will help redirect members and attendees to the Membership area. The Table for Magazines and Books will not be in the Lobby area. These items may be in the Membership area to control the grabbing of magazines which has been reported as being done for resale by certain individuals and to hand out to individuals who are interested in joining a mineral or gem club.

Door Prizes not picked up at the show will be taken by Mary Hicks who will arrange their delivery to the winners.

The Table for Business Cards and other club (show) information could be in the Lobby area for attendees to see on the way out. This would help attendees to pause to see if they are listed as a Winner on the Door Prize "Rules Board".

Member Judy Brown desires to donate her fantastic Rock Lighthouse for a special raffle to benefit the club. The donation includes delivery within a limited distance from the Concord Centre. 

We are hosting a Silver Pick Field Trip, again!

We had such a great time in July of 2016 that we decided to do it again this year. Announcing our Silver Pick Field Trip 2.0! There will be over 6 tons of rocks, a lot of equipment, and rock related items for sale.

Dick and Betty Pankey are hosting this Silver Pick Field Trip. What is a Silver Pick field trip? You don't need a rock hammer, shovel, gads, pick or any other tools, just bring your rock bag and CASH (aka your silver coins/Silver Pick) and come collect in our back yard. After over 30 years of field trips and collecting we are sharing our adventures. and memories. We did the digging, hauling, sorting and cleaning so that all you have to do is choose and pay. We have collected in many of the western states and in a few Midwest and Eastern states. We collected: obsidian at Davis Creek and Glass Butte; petrified wood in UT, WY, AZ, CA, NV, OR and WA; geodes and nodules at Wiley Wells, NM, NV, OR, UT, TN and IA; chalcedony roses and nodules at Round Mountain, NM; volcanics in northern CA; travertine in AZ and CA; jasper and agates from all over the place; bertrandite from UT; quartz crystals from AR, CA, and NM; Trona mineral specimens; and a whole lot more.

We will host this Silver Pick Field Trip of Friday, Saturday, Sunday (each weekend), June 15th to 24th; 8:00 AM to 4:00 PM and Monday thru Thursday by appointment, at our home in Pittsburg, CA. Directions: 4310 Kingsly Dr., Pittsburg, CA 94565 In Pittsburg take Buchanan Rd. to Suzanne (stoplight) turn south and follow signs with orange paper plates. Go south about 1/2 mile and turn right on to Kingsly Dr. Drive up the hill to 4310 Kingsly Dr.

Jade Cove was definitely a required destination for a true Rockhound adventure! Low tide, good shoes and determination are needed to rope repel down the challenging climb to the beach. Nearby Willow Creek was an easier beach to collect botryoital jade. Cheryl Morgan told a story about how her mother, Naomi, was stopped by a game warden as she hiked up from a beach. The game warden suspected abalone poaching and demanded that Naomi empty her "three bags of rocks". Only Rocks were found in the sacks, so the officer decided to help Naomi repack and carry the heavy load back up the hill. Lyle Roessler collected blue jade, mariposa with pyrite and interesting botryoital specimens. Lyle made several of these items into beautiful lapidary pieces. Mike Hopkins shared a strange specimen, a giant shark tooth piercing into a whale bone vertebrae. The geologic time scale of 26 million years versus 40 modern years made this a cool conversation piece. Chuck Olson told us how he likes to collect garden rock of all kinds. Going on fieldtrips, from collecting wonderstone to digging out coquina shell fossils, meeting so many Club members was the real treasure. Dennis Freiburger intrigued us with stories about Austin, Nevada. Where else can you collect fluorite, snakeskin agate, red-orange agate, visit silver- gold mines and watch F-16 fighter jets on training flights? CFMS Field Trips - North Field Trip to Davis Creek/Lassen Creek

About a year ago or so Jim Barton, the CFMS Field Trips-North chairman, asked me for ideas for a Federation field trip. I have led and attended many trips to the Davis Creek area and know that this would be a great area for a trip and told Jim that I would be glad to help. With the backing of my society, the Contra Costa M&GS will host the CFMS FT-N field trip to Davis Creek and Lassen Creek to collect the abundant and beautiful obsidian of Buck Mtn. on July 26 to 29, 2018. This trip is open to all members of the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies and their guests. Everyone who agrees to adhere to the American Federation of Mineralogical Societies Code of Ethics, abide by the direction of the field trip leaders, and practice safe rockhounding is welcome to attend.

Davis Creek/Lassen Creek is the premier California obsidian collecting area with an abundance of a great variety of beautiful obsidian. This area is noted for sheen obsidian: multi-colored rainbow, electric blue, green, mahogany-gold, silver, gold and pink sheen. Also to be found is mahogany, lace, double flow and needle obsidian. This area is located on Buck Mtn. in the heart of the Modoc National Forest. The altitude ranges from 5000 to 7000 feet. A free permit is required for collecting which will be available at camp or at the Davis Creek Store. In addition to the daily collecting trips we will have potluck dinners, happy hours, evening campfires, knapping demonstrations, and a great rockhound get-together.

We will have a potluck dinner on Saturday evening and daily happy hours. Bring firewood for evening campfires. We plan on having a good time and collecting some great obsidian. Come join us for a great rockhound time of collecting, fun and fellowship.

The daily collecting trips are on Friday, Saturday and Sunday. All trips will leave at 8:30 AM, SHARP, from the campgrounds. We will be collecting at 4 to 5 major sites for sheen obsidian: multi-colored rainbow, electric blue, green, mahogany-gold, silver, gold and pink sheen. Also to be found is mahogany, lace, double flow and needle obsidian. High clearance vehicles recommended to collecting areas. All participants are requested to read and sign a Waiver of Liability. There is float collecting and digging. Bring the following tools: rock bags, rock hammer, shovel, small picks, hoe, rock scoop, spray bottle, safety equipment and what ever else you usually bring. Safety Note: Obsidian is Mother Nature's glass and like glass it shatters and is extremely sharp. Goggles or safety glasses, long sleeve shirts and gloves are strongly recommended. There are full hook-up RV parks in Alturas and Lakeview. There are motels in Alturas and Lakeview. E-mail Dick Pankey for names and phone numbers.

The potluck dinner will be on Saturday evening. Bring food to share and your own plates, eating utensils, tables and chairs. Bring your favorite beverages and snacks to share for Happy Hour each afternoon. We will try to have a campfire each evening so bring firewood. If you are interested bring rocks and specimens, etc. from your favorite home collecting area to show and tell at the tailgate display. This will be a good time to swap maps, GPS readings and information about your favorite collecting areas. There are a lot of other rockhounding opportunities within 100 miles of the Lassen Creek site: sunstones, opal, petrified wood, other obsidian sites, geodes and more. We will conduct a cleanup of the collecting sites and campgrounds and practice "Leave No Trace".

Join Jim and me for this a great rockhounding adventure. Please notify me no later than 7/23/18 if you plan to attend; a trip flyer with directions and details is available. Contact me if you have questions or need more information:
