

Tebruary 2, 2016, BOD meeting at Dave Kleesattel's office in Concord, 7:00 pm, 2520 Stanwell Drive, Suite 105 Conference Room. Next BOD meeting is on March 9, Wednesday. Dave is changing the day of the week as some members can not all make some days. Present: Dave Kleesattel, Mary Hicks, Paul Black, Bonnie Eichler, Mary Hanjes, Terry Caskey. No quorum, 7 are needed. January BOD minutes were not approved-pending. No bills were turned in. The December 31st BofA statement was received and the balance of the checking account and the CD was given.

Policy for important dates to ensure compliance and that correct and complete information is provided on current forms was discussed and the Secretary continues to work on the Business Continuity Plan. The raffle report was returned by the Justice Dept with a transmittal letter. Others-an out of date form was used, some information was incomplete, and directions regarding filling out the form were not exactly followed. The Secretary prepared a corrected and completed report on the required forms, the president signed the report, and it was sent back within the agency's required response period. Regulatory care has not been managed; last year while preparing to do the 2014 electronic filing, it was discovered by going to the IRS Website that this was not done in 2013. The need to have the President review all compliance related reports and to have them handled by the Secretary with retained copies in the binder was discussed. It is due well before the end of this current year to allow processing and receipt of the award for announcement and presentation. Education Chair Bonnie Eichler passed around the draft application for member partial scholarship award to the Mt. Diablo Adult Jewelry class. The form was very good, minor additions were discussed and Bonnie issued the corrected copy that night.

Secretary is to make copies and bring them to the Monday meeting.


Hospitality Report



CFMS Position Statement on The New Southern California National Monuments

In light of recent developments the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies has decided to refrain from sponsoring, leading or participating in any collecting fieldtrips into the stated below regions of Southern California until the final Management Plans are finalized, published and become effective.

Collecting of Rocks, Minerals and Fossils in the Southern California Deserts and National Forests was

delivered a catastrophic disappointment this year with the creating of four new National Monuments by Executive Order. In 2015 the San Gabriel National Monument was created and closed several collecting areas which now lie within its boundaries. On February 12, 2016 President Obama created three new National Monuments in the deserts of Southern California. The Mojave Trails National Monument, the Sand to Snow National Monument and the Castle Mountains National Monuments all were created by Executive Orders. Within these monuments lies some of the best Rockhound and collecting areas in California and to list just a few: The Cady Mountains, Lavic Siding, Afton Canyon, Oro Belle and Big Chief Mines and many abandoned mines in the Southeastern San Bernardino Mountains with mine shafts, prospecting pits, and tailing piles of interest to Rockhounds.

The following is quoted from the Presidential Proclamation of the Mojave Trails National Monument. (It is included in each of the Presidential Proclamations.)

"All Federal lands and interests in lands within the boundaries of the monument are hereby appropriated and withdrawn from all forms of entry, location, selection, sale, or other disposition under the public land laws, from location, entry, and patent under the mining laws, and from disposition under all laws relating to mineral and geothermal leasing, other than by exchange that furthers the protective purposes of the monument or disposal for the limited purpose of providing materials for repairing or maintaining roads and bridges within the monument consistent with care and management of the objects identified above."

"For purposes of the care and management ... the Secretary, through the BLM, shall within 3 years of the date of this proclamation prepare and maintain a management plan for the monument and shall provide for maximum public involvement in the development of that plan including, but not limited to, consultation with tribal, State, and local governments."

"Warning is hereby given to all unauthorized persons not to appropriate, injure, destroy, or remove any feature of the monument and not to locate or settle upon any of the lands thereof."

Mark your calendar for an exciting Owens Valley Field Trip on April 1, 2, 3, 4 & 5! We're off to Big Pine, Independence, & Lone Pine, CA for all sorts of gems & minerals. This trip requires 2 travel days (Mar. 31 & April 6), & 5 collection days (April1-5). You can come for all or part of the trip. Let me know your plans so we can meet up with you each day. There are so many sites that I had to select just a few! They are primarily digging sites but you can also surface collect. TOOLS: pick, rock hammer, rake, shovel, gloves, goggles, knee/ground pad, garden claw, & similar. IF YOU HAVE A METAL DETECTOR, BRING IT! You can find artifacts & possibly gold nuggets! You'll need a hat, lots of water & ice! It gets hot out there & sun is very strong. I recommend an umbrella or portable sun shade. All of these sites are really multi-day trips so plan a full day at each one. I'll provide maps when we meet. See back for mineral list.

High clearance 4WD vehicles needed in some areas, if you don't have one, try to hitch a ride.

DIRECTIONS: Placerville to Lone Pine is about a 5 ½ hour drive. Hwy 50 east toward Tahoe,
Turn right on Hwy89 at Meyers, to Hwy88 in Hope Valley, left on 88/89down thru Woodfords, continue to Minden, NV, right on 395 south to Lone Pine. Gorgeous drive; bring your camera.

LODGING: I arranged for discount group lodging at Best Western in Lone Pine. About \$100/night

includes tax & hot breakfast so you don't have to go anywhere else! Singles can share a room to save money. There are other motels, campgrounds & lots of primitive dry camping, etc. (See back)

Portagee Joe's Campground is recommended for camping, just off Whitney Portal Rd & Turtle Rd.

Thursday, March 31st: Drive to Lone Pine. Call me if you get to town in time & I'll meet you for at Seasons for dinner at 6:30PM. Bishop is your last best chance to get any supplies you need.

Friday, April 1st: Crystal Ridge- Meet at 8:00AM East corner of Aberdeen Station Rd,
(North of Lone Pine & south of Tinemaha Reservoir). Caravan to Crystal Ridge for Smoky,
Clear & Hematite (pink/purple) Quartz Crystals, Hematite, Limonite & snail fossils, north east of Independence. Walking, climbing, digging & ground scavenging a large area.

Saturday, April 2nd: Green Monster Mine- Meet at 8:00AM at corner of Manzanar Reward Road, South of Independence, North of Lone Pine. Caravan to an old copper mine for Copper related minerals (Malachite, Azurite, Varisite, Chrysocolla, copper & mores.

Sunday, April 3rd: Brown Monster & Reward Mines- Meet 8:00AM at Manzanar Reward Road turn-off, north of Lone Pine & south of Tinemaha Reservoir. Caravan to abandoned series of mines with lots of ruins & a vast array of minerals. There's actually a huge adit (tunnel) that brave persons can drive through (at your own risk)! A very vast area & lots of tailings. Hiking & climbing. May need high clearance to drive to upper reaches, or walk. Monday AM, April 4th: The Haystack- Meet at 8:00AM Lone Pine Narrow Gauge Road at. Caravan to 2 locations for Amazonite, Aquamarine, and Opalite outside of Lone Pine.

Two different locations in one area. (Amazonite & Blue Beryl. Best bet is to hike to the top of either, working your way up & down. Hiking & climbing; rock breaking & digging.

<u>Tuesday AM, April 5th: Alabama Hills</u>- Meet at 8:00AM west of Lone Pine, at corner of Whitney Portal Rd & Movie Rd. Caravan to private claims for GOLD. Metal detect, dig, or dry wash for gold nuggets & gold in quartz. The eagle-eyed may even spot small pieces on the ground!

CFMS Public Lands Advisory Committee By John Martin, Chair

This is just a reminder, because you have read this before. It is the beginning of a new year for the politicians, lobbyists, lawyers and special interest groups. They are hard at work doing their best to change the face of our landscape and our ability to pursue our interest in our own collecting of rocks, minerals and fossils from our Public Lands through legislation, regulation and proclamation.

Much of the public lands we use are being closed to motorized access to supposedly protect the environment and wildlife habitat that may or may not exist where collecting areas have been used for decades. Without motorized access to our collecting areas soon we will only be able to access them by foot or horseback. The decision makers keep closing access roads because they keep hearing from special interest groups who only seem to want the land to be gazed upon from a distance, a long distance. We, the Rockhounds, amateur collectors of Rocks, Minerals and Fossils must become engaged at the grass roots level and make our voices heard as loud as those of the other special interest groups. We must become one of the Special Interest Groups speaking up to protect our interest in the management of our public lands for now and our future generations to use and enjoy. When an alert is received, whether through CFMS, ALAA, national or local news outlets, Blogs or any means, take the time to read and understand what is being planned for your collecting areas. If you do not speak up and make your voice heard, we will lose our ability to pursue our American Right to access and use of our public lands as Rockhounds within the guidelines that have been established for the collecting of Rocks, Minerals and Fossils and the AFMS Code of Ethics and AFMS Land Use Policy Statement. As always if you need more information on an issue the CFMS Website can supply you with contact information or contact the CFMS - PLAC members at plac@antelecom.net and we will attempt to find answers to your concerns or provide guidance in contacting the responsible legislator or Land Manager.
