

After the program, snacks were enjoyed. Attendees were asked to leave starting at 9:15 pm.


The room was turned over to the Centre at 9:25 pm. End.

Petrified Wood Seminar

Palm, Dicote, Conifer! What are they? In our case they are types of petrified wood. At shows, at rock shops or in the field and you see an unusual rock, is it petrified wood? What kind of wood? This seminar will teach you the basics of petrified wood identification, characteristics used to identify petrified wood, and how to distinguish between the types of petrified wood. This seminar will be held on Saturday, April 21, 2018 at the Community Presbyterian Church, 200 E. Leland Rd., in Pittsburg, CA. This is the same place where we have hosted several NBFT meetings. This will be an approximately 6+ hour seminar starting at 9:30 AM and concluding at about 4:00 PM. Cost of the seminar is \$30 to be paid at signup to guarantee your spot. Included in the cost you will receive a lighted pocket microscope. Since our society subsidizes our classes you will receive a \$10 refund upon completion of the seminar. There is a limit of 10 attendees (we need a minimum of 5 participant). So don't delay in signing up.

The seminar is presented by renowned experts Keith Lindholm and Carol Lockhart. This is a hands on seminar with a lot of personal attention. Bring 2 or 3 specimens that you would like to identify. Polished slabs work the best. There will be a short break for lunch so bring snacks or a sack lunch (we do not have time to go out for lunch). Coffee and bottled water will be available.


(then click on Basic Jewelry - Designed for the Hobbyist.) Online registration begins about 3-4 weeks prior to the class.

Members are not required to apply for the club's tuition reimbursement scholarship in order to take this class, but if you haven't been awarded the scholarship previously, there's no reason not to apply! The presentation requirement portion of the scholarship is minimal. The presentation does not have to be long – more like a 'show & tell' for a minute or two.

The scholarship is open to all members in good standing with the club. (The only exception being prior winners of this particular scholarship; they cannot re-apply.) This is an outstanding opportunity for our membership. The winner of the reimbursement scholarship will be selected at the March Board meeting. **Application submission deadline is February 28, 2018.** (Submitting a scholarship application does not register you for the class.) Send applications to the board at P0 Box 842, Concord, CA 94522 or submit to the Education Chair in person at the February general meeting.

Get a jump start on your presents this year or making components for your jewelry pieces. You can create your own designs or purchase wax patterns already made. (You can even alter pre-made wax patterns to suit your needs.) If you eve questions about the class, don't hesitate to ask. It's a casual environment (we're not graded) and everybody lps each other when needed. It's a lot of fun; get a friend or two to take the class with you!




