The next BOD meeting is on April 6th, Wednesday at 7 PM at Dave's office in Concord. The President will not be able to attend the April General Meeting. BOD minutes for January and February meetings were approved. Call for approval by Mary Hanjes, seconded by Terry Caskey, all ayes. Secretary did not have mail to distribute; PO Box was checked before the meeting. Terry Caskey was thanked for sending out the CFMS newsletter with the emailed club newsletter. Harry Nichandros, WebMaster, eports that he received some emails about the show from vendors. The site needs to be updated for meetings and activities. Some clubs listed on the site are no longer active. Mary Hicks has not been able to get on the member section, she needs help.

Budget. The draft budget was handed out in January 2016. Dick Pankey said the Federation Director expense may be less. The newsletter estimate needs to go up \$100 to \$600. Accepting the budget with the stated changes was moved by Mary Hicks, seconded by Dick Pankey, all ayes. It was believed that Bonnie is working on rock hound of the year, limited discussion as she was not present. The proceeds from the raffle at the General Meeting are to go into the Badge Fine bucket. This money is the source for the Holiday Specimen that is awarded once per year to a club member at random at the December meeting. The money to support the Adult Education Lost Wax scholarship is from club assets. Audit of 2015 financial records is needed, an audit letter is needed for Secretary and reasurer records, the audit may be on March 21st. After this is done, the Secretary will file the Federal information which is due before May 15th of each

year. Donation letter form and procedure is pending as Dennis was not at the meeting. Club is interested in sponsoring a member to CFMS Camp Paradise this fall. Auction will be in September.

Hazel Woolsey is recovering from surgery. It was with sadness that the Board was informed that Bill Morgan passed away. His service is on Saturday, March 19th, 10:30 a.m. at Ouimet Bros. Funeral Home on Clayton Rd. Concord, gathering at Oakhurst Country Club afterward. Cards were mailed by the board.

Mary Hanjes Treasurer said there was not much activity. There are 113 members per the form filed with CFMS at the beginning of 2016. Dick Pankey reported that the federation membership committee wants clubs to provide membership with a brief 5 minute description of position of job duties and responsibilities, time required to do duties, personal rewards etc. This is in the hope that more people will be comfortable taking over a club position. Also, the Bylaws are a good source to learn about club positions. Dick will talk about Federation Director at the general meeting.

Harry Nichandros reported on the 2016 show. He requested approval of a dealer list. Mary Hicks moved the list be approved, Terry Caskey seconded. Discussion: there was one dealer that the board questioned. The motion was amended by Mary Hicks, seconded by Terry Caskey and approved by the Board. A copy of the list is in the President, Treasurer, Secretary, and Show Chair records. The vendor list is **confidential** and is the responsibility of the Show Chair. Anyone contacting club members about vendors and charges etc., should be referred to the Show Chair. Therese Clark, Property, says the Trailer registration is due in October and that the rent for the storage unit is paid quarterly.

Debbie Blevins will work with Hazel Woolsey to coordinate duties of Historian and retrieve club records. Therese Clark says the record retention for club records (not the newsletter) is current year plus 6 years. The newsletters which contain the BOD minutes and annual membership list are held indefinitely. Therese developed a system where

records are in envelopes with the years date on the outside so when it is time to dispose of then it is straight forward. Thank you Therese..

Unfortunately Paul Black was not present but under unfinished business remembrance books were mentioned. Mary Hicks will order service pins for 2015 and will make sure the year will be on them. The Board is looking forward to receiving an updated membership list soon.

CCMGS March General Meeting

Meeting came to order with the Pledge of Allegiance at 7:35 PM at Centre Concord, Clayton Road, Concord, CA. President Dave Kleesattel led the meeting. His Safety Moment was to be careful driving with all the pot-holes that have developed in the area roadways. Guests were introduced including Barb Matz who is doing the presentation this evening. Harry Nichandros and Vikki Hottop won door prizes. Betty Pankey collected badge fines. Mary Hicks brought in a halite specimen from Searles Lake for a raffle item. We collected \$22 dollars and member Mike Fedoroff won the specimen. Membership says the new roster is going out soon. Pick up your membership card if you have not received it. DUES are BEYOND LATE if not paid by this date. The club lost two members recently, Bill Morgan and Harry Short. Articles from the CCTimes about these two members were on the table along with cards to sign. There was also a get well card for Hazel Woolsey who is recovering from surgery. Kelly Plumb reported on Shows and Field Trips. Information was on the back table and is in the newsletter. Education Chair Bonnie Eichler needs teachers for classes. 3/31 is the filing deadline for the "scholarship" application to help a member pay for the Mount Diablo Adult Education Jewelry course. The class starts on 4/15 and needs to be registered with the Adult Education administration. Dick Pankey, Federation Chair spoke about a survey done by CFMS about how to get more membership involved in the leadership of clubs. They think the

reluctance may be that individuals do not understand what a particular "job" is. So Dick went over the main points of the Federation Director job and responsibilities. In the last 30 years the club has had two directors. There are two meetings per year; there is reimbursement for approved expenses. Details are in the bylaws. He also said the job is a balance between representing CFMS and CCMGS. It is a Liaison position. He writes a monthly article for the newsletter. He attends the club's BOD meetings and General meetings and supports the Education Show. As far as skills needed, the most important quality is being committed. He gets a lot of personal rewards from doing the job. He has 10 years in.

Wire wrapping taught by Kelly Plumb, date and location of class to be determined.





A youngster found a 5" Megalodon Tooth surface collecting! These are nice collector items as well as great for wire wrap or jewelry. Bakersfield is about 5 hours drive from Placerville so this is a 2-Day trip to make your drive worthwhile. See the back for lodging & food options,













California 's New National Monuments What they mean to Rockhounds

By now the word is out. There are three new national monuments in the deserts of Southern California. These monuments were created by presidential proclamation on February 12, 2016. These monuments include most of the known and favorite collecting areas in the desert. Written into the proclamations are statements which make it unlawful to remove any article from within the boundaries of the monument.

Does this mean there is no more Rockhounding in the desert? Not necessarily, although right now according to the law set in the proclamations it is unlawful to remove anything from the monuments. Also written into the proclamations is the requirement for the Secretary of the Interior to formulate and release a Monument Management Plan, which requires participation and inputs from the public.

This Management Plan must be released within 3 years of February 12, 2016. This is the time frame and the process that willallow Recreation nal Rockhounding within these National Monuments. It will only happen if all of the member clubs and societies of the California Federation of Mineralogical Societies and all Rockhounds contact their elected officials and let them know that as a voting American you want Recreational Rockhounding written into the National Monument Management Plans.

If we do not speak up with a united voice we will surely lose our rights to collect rocks, minerals and fossils on our public desert lands in Southern California. As this process proceeds, information on public meetings and ways you can help to keep your rights to Recreational Rockhounding alive in the Deserts of Southern California will be provided as it becomes available.
