November 11, 2015, 7:10 pm, Stanwell Drive, Concord, Ca

Brief discussion occurred regarding a rock sample that was used at the recent rock identification class given by Dave Kleesattel, the rock is a Liesegang with rings. Official meeting started at 7:10 pm. Meeting was adjourned at 9:00 pm. No Board Meeting in December. Next meeting is in January 2016.

Present: Dave Kleesattel, Mary Hicks, Terry Caskey, Dick Pankey, Paul Black, Mary Jernigan, Bonnie Eichler, Mary Hanjes. Absent: Harry Nichandros. Therese Clark, Donna Albrecht, Hazel Woolsey. President Dave Kleesattel called the meeting to order. Correspondence-PO Box last visited on 11/2/2015. Membership received two letters, Chuck Olson, Judy Brown. Newsletters from CFMS, AFMS, ALAA. Two letters held for Show Chair Harry Nichandros. Scanned and emailed to Harry was a letter from an interested Vendor and his requested letter from IRS verifying club's charity status. An IRS letter verifying charity status was received by the club and a copy of the given to Harry before the show. Correction to the last BOD minutes is to include Dennis Freiburger who was at the meeting. Mary Hanjes moved to approve the amended minutes, Bonnie Eichler seconded. All ayes. One bill was handed in for an annual required filing with the California Secretary of State. No Website report. It is not known if the reporting of raffles happened. (The state requires either individual or a single combined raffle report for activity during the permit period.) There were a number of raffles between September 1, 2014 and August 31, 2015. Dave will follow-up with Harry about this. Mary Hanjes reports about \$800 was raised at the October General Meeting auction. Discussion followed about the use of money in the three areas of education which was determined at the last BOD meeting. Earth Science, CFMS, DVC. Dick said Zzyzx is applied for after November for dates 3/27 - 4/3/16 for \$390 per person in the Mojave. Camp Paradise is in northern California in August or September in 2016. CFMS receiving money for scholarship was discussed. The opportunity of the club participating in the awarding of the CFMS scholarship was questioned. The President will make an announcement at the upcoming General Meeting to determine interest in 50% cost support for Camp Paradise. Discussion: Should we offer more choices? Are we eliminating the other choices? No it is just we are working with this motion now. Motion was all ayes. Next Bonnie made a motion to seek out level of interest for the Mount Diablo Education class. Paul Black seconded. Discussion: Bonnie describe the lost wax jewelry class. The fact that these classes are not to be confused with the classes given by the club was discussed. Motion vote all

Discussed: Membership involvement. It is proposed we have a monthly get together to discuss our interests starting next year. Items can be brought to discuss, etc. Saturday from 10:00 to 11:30 am. Suggestion: That the club sponsor a student each semester (not duplicating members) for the silver smith/lost wax casting class held at the Mt. Diablo Adult Education campus. Dick Pankey is leaving soon for the CFMS Federation Fall meeting in Visalia. He is taking the clipped stamps that our members have turned in to him and will take the Rock Hound of the year information if it is ready. He announced that at Thanksgiving time there is a get together trip (not a field trip) at Area 51 just about 1 mile off of Hwy 5, plenty of information on Goggle, about 2 hours south. This area has camping near a river wash and plenty of motels along the highway. The area has plenty of material dumped there from the excavation of the California Aqueduct. The needles are voids which are v-shaped, long and look like mineral inclusions, called the Tindell effect. The phenomenon cannot be seen in regular indoor light. Special fluorescent 5000 Kelvin lights are needed. We were treated with a fantastic display of the special quartz crystals that represented some of Sharon's collection. Specimens collected over 45 years have come from Brazil, Madagascar, China, USA. These are mysterious rare specimens. Meeting ended around 9:00 pm. Refreshments were enjoyed.

Several people showed an interest in the Lost Wax class offered at Mt. Diablo Adult Education during our November meeting. 

CFMS Fall Director's Meeting By Dick Pankey, Federation Director

With only a couple of exceptions for the last 25 years Betty and I have taken our trailer to Visalia to attend the California Federation of Mineralogical Society's Fall Director's meeting. We "camp' in the back parking lot of the Holiday Inn. Surprise!! The motel is now owned by Wyndham but basically we had the same service that we have always had. It was a beautiful weekend in Visalia for the CFMS Fall Director's meeting. It is a great time when people from California, parts of Nevada and parts of Arizona get-together to share ideas and conduct the business of the Federation. It is a concentrated time of committee reports, election of officers, financial reports and more. It is at the Fall meeting that we approve the budget, and elect and install officers for the coming year. The weekend of the Directors meeting is also the time for many committee meetings and it is often the only time we see many of the other officers, chairmen and committee people from around the state. Fortunately most of us have email these days, which really helps in conducting the workings of the Federation.

But there is more than just the one meeting to fill our time over the weekend. Many people arrive on Friday and don't head home until late Sunday morning. Starting Friday afternoon the 5 Federation officers hold one of their several Executive Committee meetings which lasted almost 4 hours. There also were several committees meeting including the CFMS and AFMS Scholarship Com., and a final Nominating Com. meeting. That evening there was the Cracker Barrel; an informal get-together for socializing and sharing of ideas. The Directors' meeting was held Saturday morning and concluded at about 12:30. In the afternoon, after a quick lunch I attended the Long Range Planning Committee made up of all living past CFMS Presidents and the current Executive committee. Saturday evening was the banquet to install the 2016 officers. The meeting concluded Sunday morning with the new president's change over meeting with the other new officers and the committee chairs. A full weekend conducting the business of the Federation.

Directors' Meeting highlights:

O The meeting was called to order followed by the Pledge to the Flag, the Invocation and the In Memoriam to

- recognize departed members. Each society is given an opportunity to give the names of departed members from their society.
- O There was a very good turnout of directors. 55 directors representing approximately 110 societies; all 5 officers and 25 committee chairs. When a society does not have a director present their society does not have a voice in the business of the Federation. There were 2 first time directors.
- O There was only 1 delinquent society the Bay Area Searchers and the other good news no societies disbanded or resigned from the Federation.
- O The 2015 Show was put on by the Federation because no society stepped up to host the show. The show was held at the Grape Festival Grounds in Lodi. Besides being a great show it was financially very successful earning \$17,802 for the Federation.
- O The El Dorado Co. M&GS will host the 2016 CFMS Show in Placerville, CA on September 16, 17 & 18. This show will be held in conjunction with the World Gold Panning Championships. The shows and events promises to be a fantastic week of Gold, parades, car show, music and a great gem and mineral show. Show information will be on the web site soon with registration, competitive and noncompetitive forms and information about the attractions around the area. Contact me for more information and copies of the forms. Betty and I are planning to attend and to exhibit. Attendance and exhibiting is open to all members. If you would like to attend or just want more information please contact me.

- O The 2017 show will be in Ventura, CA. This will be a combined CFMS & AFMS Show and Convention; a really big event. And it is less than 300 miles away This is one of my favorite show sites; big spacious show buildings with camping and all show activities right on the Fairgrounds. Betty and I will be there.
- O The officers for 2016 were elected:

 President John Martin, 1st VP
 Margaret Kolaczyk, 2nd VP Kim

 Campbell-Erb, Treasurer Tony Fender

 and Secretary Louisa Carey. Being an

 officer in the CFMS is typically a 5 year

 commitment of "going through the chair".
- O The 2016 Budget was approved with revenues of approximately \$97,500 and expenses of approximately \$109,050. There is a projected gain of \$11,500; any actual loss can be made up from the CFMS Endowment Fund.
- O There will not be an increase is dues or insurance for 2016. The dues are \$1.25 to the CFMS and \$.75 to the AFMS per member. The insurance is \$6.00. Total due to CFMS is \$8.00 per member which is the same for the last few years.
- O Earth Science Studies: The one week Camp Zzyzx is scheduled for March 27 to April 3. The cost remains at \$390 for room, meals and most class supplies. If you use your own RV there is a \$50/person discount. See me for more information and application forms. The reservations for Zzyzx are now open. This session will fill up fast. Preference will be given to "first timers". There is a lot of interest in this great camp.
- O There were only 2 entries in the CFMS
 All American Club and 9 entries in the

- AFMS contest. This is a great competition where the society prepares a scrapbook of the years activities and accomplishments. CCM&GS has not entered since 2003. We have a strong, active and involved society and could score well. We just need someone willing to assemble our book.
- O Membership in the CFMS is declining, both societies and individuals. Society membership is declining and it is becoming increasingly difficult getting members to become officers and committee chairmen. The Membership Committee is developing ideas to address these issues. One suggestion is to have each officer and committee chair to present to the membership what their position entails at a meeting and in the newsletter.
- Debbie Bunn who collects them for the Easter Seals Society in the name of CFMS. Thanks to all of you that saved and gave me stamps over the past year. Saving stamps has been an ongoing project of the Federation, which is a moneymaker for the Easter Seal Society. It is easy to help; just cut any and all stamps from your mail, put them in an envelope or zip lock bag and give them to me.
- O Again this year only three honorees were nominated this year to present a \$2000 CFMS Scholarship to an undergraduate student so the CFMS will award only one scholarship this year. The CFMS Scholarship fund has over \$98,264 available for scholarships but can not be awarded unless a local society (our society?) nominates an honoree to help select and present a scholarship to an

undergraduate student. CCM&GS can nominate an honoree. There are sufficient funds for scholarships but they can only be given out by an honoree nominated by a CFMS society. The CCM&GS may nominate an honoree to recognize the service of one of our members to education.


- Ø AFMS Scholarship honoree was not announced.
