



FINDING LIGHT INSIDE YOUR ROCK!

Luminescence is common in many minerals and at some localities, e.g. Franklin NJ, is found in tens of different species having differing luminescent colors. In many cases luminescence can be so profound, e.g. with many species emitting different colors in the same specimen, that the pieces can be valued in the many thousands of dollars. Some rare species command prices over thousand dollars for a 4 inch specimen even with no visible crystals. Luminescent minerals are often found in high temperature

metamorphic zones, but are also common in pegmatites, evaporites and in lead-zinc deposits. Examples from these localities and others will be shown, and the collecting hobby, the equipment needed, and the information available on the web and in books will be described. Finally, the basic mechanisms of luminescence and why minerals show the colors that they do will be explained.

Glenn Waychunas is a retired group leader at Lawrence Berkeley National Laboratory, and a past lecturer and acting professor at Stanford University in materials science. He is an expert in the structure and properties of interfaces, and in x-ray and laser spectroscopy. He has published over 200 papers and book chapters on scientific subjects, including a few on mineral luminescence, which is his chief hobby. His collection of over 4000 specimens is regarded as one of the world's best luminescence collections, and he currently is investigating the nature of luminescence activation in previously unstudied minerals with colleagues in Israel and at Caltech.




CCMGS July 9, 2018 General Meeting

The Bee Goddess is out to Get Me: A Cautionary Tale for Rockhounds and all who love the Great Outdoors

So you thought that Rattle Snakes and Mosquitos were the main hazards of Rockhounding? There was a time when I thought so too. The thing about rattlesnakes is that they don't want to be around us anymore that we don't want to be around them. Making sufficient noise as you walk around looking for rocks will usually give them enough notice so that they can go somewhere that you are not. My grandmother, who was a great hiker and outdoorswoman always said "carry a big walking stick and swish it in the grass ahead of you." I never saw a rattlesnake while hiking with her. Of those I have seen since, all but two were on their way elsewhere as fast as they could go. One of those two was a little baby at the Berkeley Botanical Gardens when my daughter was six years old. It was obliviously curled up on a warm rock and not paying attention to people 50 yards away. When my daughter saw it she took off running toward it calling "how cute" with her hand outstretched to pet it. Thank goodness there were no reporters or the headline would have read "Mother Tackles Six year Old." The other time was at the new Almaden Quicksilver Mine (before the reclamation) when I slipped and fell down the mine dump. I landed three feet from a rattler. Thank goodness he was coiled around his rock! Needless to say I looked at him, he looked at me, and we both took off in opposite directions. So, given the opportunity a rattlesnake will avoid you.

As for Mosquitos, they are nasty little bloodsuckers that can potentially carry several unpleasant diseases. However most Rockhounds are sufficiently aware of them and are prepared with repellants such as OFF, DEET and even Avon Skin-So-Soft. You can minimize Mosquito bites by using citronella candles, bracelets, or coils in camp and by using repellant products out in the field.

But the Bee Goddess, what did I do to offend her?

Lets' set the stage. Several years ago I was experimenting with wire wrap jewelry and tried to make a piece with an oblong bead and only one binding. It did not go well. In a fit of frustration I yanked on the four wires surrounding the bead. The result, which looks a little bit like a butterfly has occasionally appeared in my club displays. I decided to wear it for a while to see if I liked the result.

Alan and I love to visit Hot Springs as well as rockhound on our vacations and that year we wound up in Ashland Oregon. Ashland has a swimming pool sized mineral pool and a small, very nice shaded camping area. On our way into the pool a woman stopped me and pointed to my bug necklace. "Is that a Bee?" she asked, obviously very excited. Somewhat taken aback I replied "if you want it to be I guess it could be a bee." She proceeded to inform me in an awestruck manner that there was a Bee Goddess temple just up the road so I agreed that probably made my creation a bee. She did not buy it however, so I forgot all about the Bee Goddess.

This year, on our way to the Madras Pow-Wow, we stopped at a gas station (this is a necessity from time to time.) It was hot so the window was down. Suddenly I felt a burning pain in my right arm. After yanking the stinger out and discovering that the bee has conveniently landed in an open zip-lock bag I zipped the bag shut and threw him/her in the trash. The very next day after my arm finally improved we arrived a Quants Rock Shop in Prineville Oregon. To our lelight, rumors that it had closed were greatly exaggerated. It had only moved across the street so we sat down to a pleasant afternoon of sorting through treasures. As we were preparing to leave a yellow jacked decided that my left hand was in need of a chomp. Needless to say, now my left hand swelled up and blistered in spite of ice, cortisone cream, and Benadryl.

Alan, of course, still wanted to go to the Ashland Hot Springs which we had missed on the way up to Madras. All I had to say is that when we got there my first order of business was going to be finding that Bee Goddess Temple and registering a complaint!



Olivine "green gems" shooting from Hawaii's Kilauea Volcano on the Big Island.

Dlivine is most commonly found in basaltic rock in the upper mantle of the Earth's surface. Basaltic lava can contain crystals of olivine formed deep in the volcano and trapped in the basaltic rock as it reaches the surface. "Olivine bombs" contain gems that separate from the rock as the lava flow explodes in the ocean. Gem quality is called peridot. Olivine is one of the minerals made up of silicate structure called nesosilicates.

Editor's Choice Recipe. (Unfortunately, we no longer can serve eggs at the Annual Education Show.) Here is the recipe for the popular Egg Salad Sandwiches from Ophelia Hicks.

Portion is 1 egg per sandwich. Hard boil 50 to 60 eggs. Peel eggs and slice using an egg slicer once, rotate the egg 90 degrees and slice a second time. Mix chopped eggs with 1 cup sweet relish, 1 cup finely chopped celery, ¼ cup finely chopped onion, 1-pint mayonnaise, pepper and salt very lightly.

Use an ice cream scoop to put egg mixture on a slice of bread, spread evenly. Top with romaine lettuce. Lightly spread mayonnaise on top slice of bread and cover sandwich. Refrigerate until time to serve.
