
Pipes of Peace Much More than Red Clay

Catlinite is a rare and unique form of red clay. Also called Pipestone, Catlinite has been used by native Americans for political and religious purposes for hundreds of years. Made into pipes, the term "peace pipe" came into being as a result of whites encountering them at treaty signings. Minnesota is historically the origin of the peace pipes. American Indians believe that when a prayer is given with the smoking of the pipe, those prayers are carried to the Great Spirit on the smoke.

Mary Hicks is our presenter – continuing a personal and family history about the pipes. She will also showcase a video and bring examples of Catlinite (Pipe stone), peace pipes, and the overlaying quartzite from the Minnesota area.



Recognition and Membership

The CFMS and AFMS have a number of programs that recognize individuals, members, and societies. Every year CFMS, and by that I mean the societies and their members, have several opportunities to recognize, thank and honor one of their members or a non-member who makes a contribution to our hobby and goals. There is the Rockhound of the Year Award, CFMS Scholarship Honoree, AFMS Scholarship Honoree, and Golden Bear Award for service to the Federation, Bulletin and author competition, and Website competition; I am sure I am missing some others. Unfortunately CFMS struggles every year to get nominations for these awards. It is so easy to make a nomination: select a deserving person or couple to be honored, write a letter of nomination with the reasons they are deserving of the award and submit it our president for action by our board of directors. After approval by the board the letter of nomination is mailed to the appropriate CFMS committee. We have many deserving members. It is that easy and will make someone very proud and honored to be thought of as deserving by our society. Saying "thank you for your service" is so easy and it doesn't cost the society anything and the rewards are great for everyone.

Every year each society of the CFMS can select one adult and one junior member as their "Rockhound of the Year". The criteria for this award are for current and/or past service to the CCM&GS. A letter of nomination is sent to the Chairman of the Rockhound of the Year committee that is published in the CFMS Newsletter. This letter is then sent to the AFMS newsletter for publication. The selected members get a certificate from the CFMS and a Rockhound of the Year pin to wear. Rockhound of the Year is not a competition but is a recognition and thank you to one of our members. CCM&GS has been participating in

this program for many years.

The CFMS awards undergraduate scholarships each year for \$2000. Many years ago the CFMS established a Scholarship Endowment Fund with contributions from individual members and societies. Only the earnings from this fund can be used for scholarship awards. Awarding a scholarship is a 2 step process. First a society nominates a person that they wish to recognize for outstanding service to the educational pursuits of the society. If selected by the CFMS this Scholarship Honoree selects a college or university in California or Nevada and participates with that school to select a qualified student majoring in Geology, Earth Sciences or Jewelry Arts. CCM&GS has only nominated 1 of our members as a Scholarship Honoree. Dr. Walt Carr was our Scholarship Honoree in the early 2000's. In years past the CFMS has awarded as many as 5 scholarships in a year, but in the last 10 years only 1 or 2 scholarships have been awarded due to the lack of Scholarship Honoree nominations from a society. No honoree, no scholarship award. The money stays in the Scholarship Fund and a deserving student does not get any money.

The All American Club competition is recognition for our whole society. It is so easy to do, just collect articles, stories, letters, pictures, etc. and make a scrapbook. In reality this is a competition of "Brag Books." It records and documents the activities and accomplishments of our society for the year. Our club historian is collecting much of the needed documentation already. The best time to start this project is at the beginning of the year by getting the forms and the rules from the All American Club Chairman. Plan out the information to be collected and assign photographers and reporters. Collect and file this information throughout the year. Prepare our book in December and January then submit it by the

end of February. It is that easy!

A special committee evaluates and scores each book against the criteria outlined in the forms, not against each other. Certificates are awarded based on the score: 70 to 79 points, Bronze Award, 80 to 89 points, Silver Award and 90 to 100 points, Gold Award. After the CFMS judging the books are sent to AFMS for judging. AFMS awards certificates and medallions based on the same scoring system.

Recognition and Membership Continued:

For some reason very few clubs participate in the All American Club competition. A couple of clubs enter regularly every year or two. These clubs have a great record of their club's activities and accomplishments. These books are a great membership tool. When a guest or prospective member asks, "what does CCM&GS do?" your All American Club "brag book" has the answers. We have participated in the past and already have the resource. Don't hide it away in the library or someone's bookshelf. Bring it to all of your meetings to share with the members and guests. Now is the time to start working on our All American Club book.

A few more words about member recognition. All the hard working dedicated members do what they do for the club, because they enjoy what they are doing not for medals and certificates. However, a thank you is probably well disserved and appreciated and it helps fight "burnout." And a nomination for one of the CFMS honors really says that the CCM&GS recognizes their contribution. This can help with member retention. People like to be part of an organization that recognizes and appreciates its members. I have the information about all the CFMS honors. We have members who deserves a **Big Thank You**, who should we recognize and honor this year?

Rockhounds also collect stamps

For as long as I can remember I and the members of the Contra Costa M&GS have snipped canceled stamps to donate to Easter Seals. It is just something we did and but really didn't know much about the "why's" and "where for's" of the program. We snipped the stamps, took them to the CFMS Directors' meeting each year and passed them on to someone who took them to Easter Seals. This is all true but not complete and accurate.

The complete story starts with the Sacramento Philatelic Society (stamp collectors). In 1957 they held their first show and sale with the proceeds going to the Easter Seals Society. The first year they donated \$200. Donations have increased every year and for the past many years have seen around \$5000 or more. CFMS involvement has a long history. It started in the late 70's or early 80"s. For many years CFMS Past President Ellen Schulte accepted and took the CFMS

amp donations to the Sacramento Philatelic Society for their sale. Debbie Bunn assumed the duties from Ellen some 15 to 20 years ago. At the Directors' Meeting people would parade up to Debbie to present the stamp donations. The stamp parade has been growing bigger each year.

How does the stamp sale and donation to Easter Seal work? The Sacramento Philatelic Society holds the sale each spring. The stamps are soaked off the envelope and dried. For the sale the stamps are piled onto large tables for the public to sort through and buy for \$.02 each. Sort of like sifting through dirt and sand looking for crystals. Left over stamps are sold to bulk dealers by the pound.

So how does this whole stamp project work for CFMS? It starts at the club member level; it is easy to do; when you get your mail each day just cut the stamps off of the envelopes and stick them in a Ziploc bag or envelope. When the bag is full give it to the Federation Director to take to the Directors' meeting. I will accept the stamp donations at the meeting and arrange for them to get to the Sacramento Philatelic Society for the next sale. The Society then donates the proceeds of the sale to the Easter Seals Society. All donations stay in California.

I am sure someone will ask, "How does this benefit CFMS? What do we get out of this?" I can think of several benefits: It involves society members in the work of the CFMS, it gives the Federation Director another reason to come to the Directors' meeting, and most of all it is a worthy philanthropic project for a disserving worthwhile charity for very little effort.


